The first three commandments maintain the vertical relationship with God, echoing Jesus' injunction to love God with all our hearts and minds. The subsequent commandments guide the horizontal relationship with our fellow men. Despite this seem in grompartmentalization, both decrees to love God and our neighbor go hand in hand; thus, we cannot claim to love God and hate our neighbor (1 John 4:20).

Thus, love serves as the foundation for every Christian value and ethics.

However, the current state of the world, marked by conflicts like the war between Russia and Ukraine, geopolitical tensions in the Middle East and in Africa, as well as the ecological crises, economic warfare, deliberate exploitation, and various forms of evil afflicting nations, reflects our collective failure to internalize Christ's command to love God and our neighbor.

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
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

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Introduction

The African continent, as a result, hosts the largest number of refugees and displaced persons globally.

In light of the aphorism "ubimultitudo, ubipeccata," the African predicament has evolved, encompassing domestic and cross-border conflicts fuelled by ancient feuds, brutal ethnic, religious, social,

the Pope delivered a powerful message in the garden of the Palais de la Nation, proclaiming, "Hands off Africa! Stop choking Africa: it is not a mine to be stripped or a terrain to be plundered. May Africa be the protagonist of its own destiny! May Africa, the smile and hope of the world, count for more. May it be spoken of more frequently, and have greater weight and prestige among the nations!" This apostolic journey, hailed by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie as "a tribute to the primary importance of ordinary human beings," aimed at promoting reconciliation in conflict-ridden countries and advocating for their independence from foreign

The Democratic Republic of Congo, positioned in Central Africa and ranking as the second-largest country on the continent after Algeria, gained independence from Belgium in 1960. Despite boasting vast deposits of industrial diamonds, cobalt, copper, forest reserves, and hydroelectric potentials, the nation grapples with extreme poverty, affecting over 50% of its population—roughly 100 million people.

Unfortunately, this plight is not unique to the DRC but extends across much of sub-Saharan Africa.

In a distressing narrative, many African countries, abundantly blessed with invaluable natural resources such as diamonds, crude oil, gold, platinum, and uranium, still find themselves mired in abject poverty. This reality positions Africa as the poorest continent globally, despite its immense potential. Astonishingly, the economic power of the entire African continent is just about half of that of Japan—a country
